

STREET TREE MANAGEMENT PLAN SURVEY

The City of Seattle's Department of Transportation (SDOT) oversees trees along streets and in other right of way (ROW) areas. To better manage this task, we launched the Street Tree Management Plan (STMP) in 2016. Through inventorying, maintaining and replacing activities, this citywide plan aims to improve the condition of SDOT maintained street trees by the end of 2024.

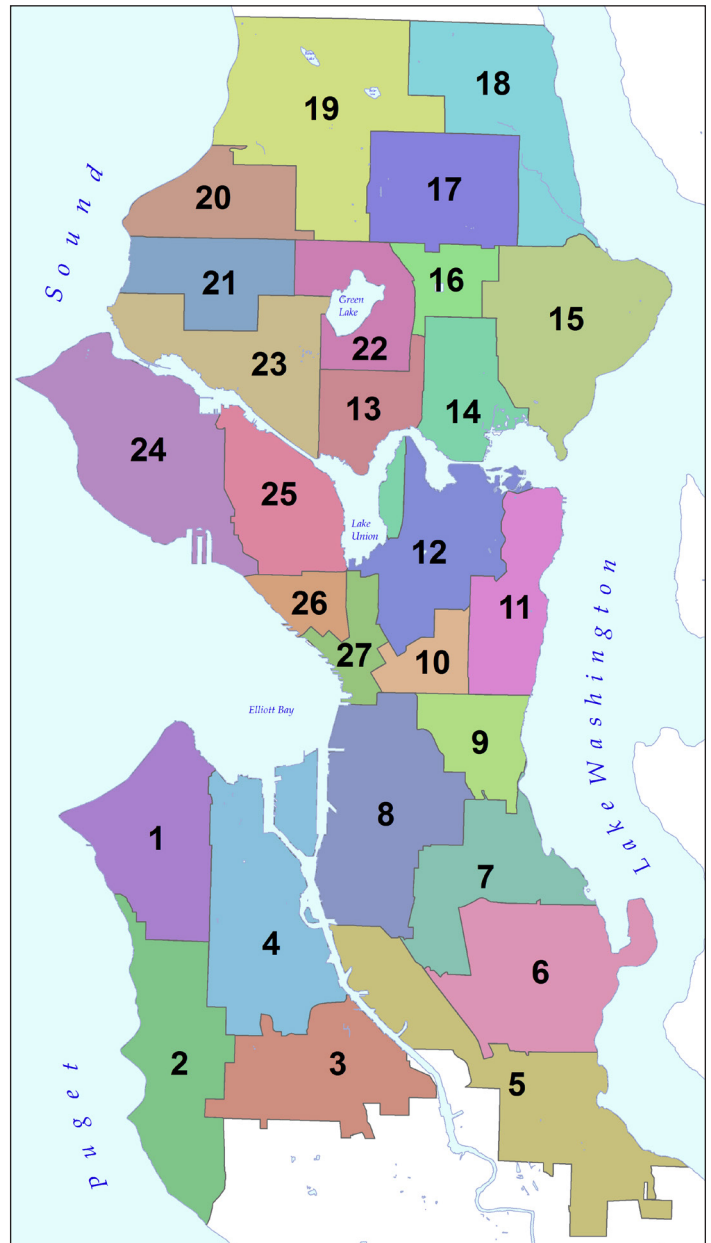
